

Ensuring Professional Leadership in Music Education Reform in NSW: MTANSW's Position on the Joint Select Committee's Inquiry into Arts and Music Education and Training Report no 1 for consideration by Government as it prepares its response due by 12 March 2025

17 February 2025

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Introduction

The **Music Teachers' Association of New South Wales (MTANSW)** welcomes the **Joint Select Committee's Inquiry Report** and calls for a **substantive government response** that delivers **systemic, long-term reforms** to ensure universal access to high-quality music education in NSW.

MTANSW is the **peak professional body for music teachers in NSW**, representing teachers across **all educational settings**—including **private studios**, **schools (public, independent, and Catholic)**, **corporate providers, conservatoriums**, **and tertiary institutions**.

For over 113 years, MTANSW has been a prominent voice in music education, with state-based MTAs operating across Australia for over a century. MTANSW is currently leading the process of federating with other state MTAs to establish a unified national presence, ensuring effective engagement on critical issues such as the national curriculum, workforce development, and professional standards. This process, set to be completed by late 2025, will create the largest professional organisation in the music teaching and education landscape, strengthening advocacy and support for music educators nationwide.

Our focus in this response is ensuring that:

- The government's reforms reflect the professional expertise of music educators.
- MTANSW is included in the development of the Music Education Plan (Recommendation 12).
- Industry regulation and accreditation frameworks (Recommendation 10) are developed with the profession, for the profession.



Key Recommendations Supported by MTANSW

1. MTANSW strongly endorses Finding 4

"That it is essential for all students in New South Wales primary schools to receive quality, sequential and ongoing music learning."

Music education must be recognised as a **fundamental right** of every child. Systemic inequities in access to quality music education must be addressed **through structured policy reform** within the NSW Department of Education.

2. Support for a Government-Led Music Education Plan (Recommendation 12)

MTANSW supports the development of a **Music Education Plan**, led by the **NSW Department of Education**, and recommends that this plan:

- Be developed in **consultation with an Advisory Group**, including **MTANSW as the professional body for music teachers**, alongside music education think tanks, consultants, specialist music teachers, principals, conservatoriums, music education providers, the NSW Teachers' Federation, and tertiary institutions providing Initial Teacher Education (ITE).
- Be a long-term (10-year) commitment, with clearly defined targets, funding allocations, and annual public reporting to the Minister for Education.
- Ensure **universal access to high-quality music education** in government schools, particularly in **regional, rural, and low-SES areas**.
- Establish a clear standard for sequential, ongoing music education in NSW schools, addressing gaps between curriculum expectations and actual provision.
- Introduce mandatory minimum music education time allocations for K-6 students, delivered by qualified and confident teachers.
- Strengthen pathways for **professional development and specialist accreditation** for music educators.

3. MTANSW's Role in Regulation and Accreditation (Recommendation 10)

MTANSW is **uniquely positioned** to lead efforts to develop **appropriate industry regulation**, ensuring that:

- Any **framework for industry regulation** aligns with professional teaching standards and **supports**, **rather than hinders**, access to quality music education.
- High-quality, accredited music educators are recognised, while providing clear pathways for nonaccredited tutors to deliver basic music tuition where appropriate.
- Accreditation and professional standards are **profession-led**, rather than dictated by **external agencies with no direct expertise in music education**.



• MTANSW, as the **peak professional association for music teachers**, takes on **a role similar to professional colleges in medicine**, law, and architecture—ensuring high standards, accreditation **pathways**, and **professional development opportunities** for music educators.

This is an **opportunity to professionalise music teaching**, creating **clearer career pathways, stronger teacher training, and accreditation processes** that ensure students receive the **highest quality education** from qualified professionals.

MTANSW's Role in the Implementation of the Inquiry's Recommendations

MTANSW seeks a formal role in the implementation of the Inquiry's recommendations. Unlike philanthropic bodies or general education organisations, MTANSW represents, and is accountable to, the profession itself. Our raison d'être is ensuring high-quality music teaching is accessible to all students.

We have the capacity to:

- Advise on policy implementation, ensuring reforms align with international best practice in music education.
- Engage with music teachers across NSW to disseminate information, collect feedback, and ensure reforms are informed by real-world teaching practice.
- Provide ongoing professional development to support the implementation of any new standards or curriculum changes.

MTANSW is in the process of establishing an Advisory Council, which will:

- Provide expertise in policy, education, and industry engagement.
- Strengthen collaboration between school-based and independent music educators.
- Ensure MTANSW's policies and programs reflect evidence-based best practice.

We urge the NSW Government to **recognise MTANSW's leadership role in this space**, and to engage with us in shaping reforms that will have a **lasting impact on the profession and the quality of music education across NSW**.

Next Steps & Follow-Up

We understand that the **NSW Cabinet will now have the Government's Response in hand** and that time may not permit a meeting at this stage. However, **MTANSW stands ready to assist** in any way that may be required as the **Government moves towards implementation**.



In particular, we wish to highlight the importance of:

- **MTANSW's inclusion in the Advisory Group for the Music Education Plan** (Rec. 12), ensuring that the voice of the profession is represented in shaping its implementation.
- MTANSW's role in shaping regulation and accreditation frameworks (Rec. 10), to ensure professional standards are set with the profession, for the profession.
- The funding and resourcing of professional development pathways for music educators, to support the successful rollout of any proposed reforms.
